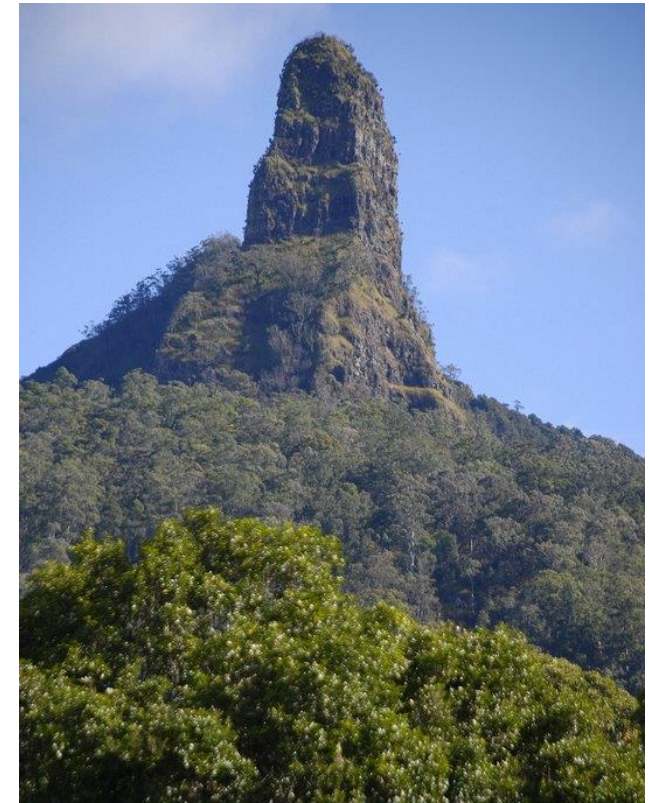




Tweed Touring



Border Ranges Circuit

One of Northern NSW's best-kept secrets, the Tweed Range Scenic Drive through Border Ranges National Park takes you along the high rim of an ancient volcanic caldera. World Heritage-listed rainforests, Antarctic beech forests dating back 2000 years, spectacular lookouts across the Tweed Valley to Mt Warning and plenty of bushwalking tracks make this an unforgettable experience.

The organic vibe continues in Uki, with a range of outlets for organic, chemical-free and ethical skincare, tea, herbs, locally grown produce and more. The old **Uki Buttery** has been converted into quaint shops, galleries and art studios where you can watch our local artists at work, or you can relax over coffee or a meal at a local café. Some of our Uki favourites include:

Glorious Organics – for a full range of organic goodies;

Happy High Herbs – for chemical-free skincare, locally blended teas, giftware and an extensive range of herbs;

Uki Bakery – famous for their pies;

Uki Café – gotta love the fire-engine red piano! A great spot for snacks or meals at any time with live music on Friday and Saturday nights;

The Lounge Lizard – Uki's newest eatery and providore with daily blackboard specials and lots of home-baked goodies;

Studio 9 Artspace – a working studio with three resident artists;

Uki Fortuna Bookshop – catch up on the daily astrological news.

CLARRIE HALL DAM

One of the prettiest places in the Tweed Valley with its lily-covered lake mirroring a stunning view of Mt Warning, **Crams Farm Picnic Area** has barbeques, seating, play areas and plenty of room for the kids to run around. The dam is also a popular spot for fly-fishing and is stocked with Bass fingerlings annually.

MT BURRELL

Sphinx Rock Café is a real favourite with the Mt Burrell locals. Fill up on a country-style breakfast, Devonshire tea, lunch or Sharon's legendary sticky date pudding. On Sunday afternoons, there's live music from 1pm to 4pm or you can buy their Live@Sphinx Rock CD and take the music with you.

BORDER RANGES NATIONAL PARK



There's nowhere else in the world where you can stand on the rim of an ancient volcanic caldera surrounded by World Heritage-listed rainforests. It's a steep climb to the top of the range and the roads are a bit rough but the views and

bushwalks make it more than worth the effort. Plan for plenty of time to stop and explore:

Bar Mountain – Wander through a forest of 2000-year-old Antarctic beech trees on the Falcorostrum Loop (750m) or the Bar Mountain Circuit (3.5km).

Blackbutts Lookout – A popular picnic spot with awe-inspiring views of Mt Warning and the Tweed Valley.

The Pinnacle – One of the best places to watch the sun rise over Mt Warning, this unique stalagmite-like rock formation is easily accessed via a 200m walk through subtropical rainforest and New England blackbutt, finishing at a lofty viewing platform.

Brindle Creek & Forest Tops – Several walks to choose from here including the Helmholtzia Loop (1.2km), named for the rare lily found here; Red Cedar Loop (750m) leading to a 48m giant believed to be around 1000 years old; and the Brindle Creek Walk (5km one way). From Forest Tops, the Booyong Walk connects with the Rosewood Loop for a 10.5km (one way) hike to Sheepstation Creek.

Sheepstation Creek – Plenty of picnic tables, campsites and a selection of walks including the Palm Forest Walk (2km) to Brushbox Falls; the Rosewood Loop (6km) and the Booyong Walk (10.5km one way) to Forest Tops.

Driving Tips – The road through the Border Ranges is not sealed. Whilst it is suitable for the average family car, special care should be taken, especially after periods of rain. Phone the Border Ranges park office on 02-6632 0000 to check on road conditions.
